Warren S. Wright was born January 14, 1938. He passed away peacefully August 18, 2025, of natural causes in St. George, Utah. He was 87 years of age. During the last months of his life, he received exceptional and loving care from his wife, Shweta.

Warren served a mission for the LDS Church, achieved a master's degree in public administration from Brigham Young University and was employed as city administrator in Mason, Michigan. He returned to Salt Lake City and spent most of his professional life in urban development.

Warren married Diane Rae Shean and later divorced. His proudest achievement was being the father of Dennis Wright, currently a professor at Brigham Young University. Dennis is married to Kimberly Sue Walker, who also teaches at BYU. Warren's grandchildren are McKenna Wright (Conner Roney), Walker Wright (Makayla), Weston Wright (Aubry), and Maitlyn Wright. The burial will take place in the Provo City Cemetery.

Warren was a volunteer in assisting school children; he also worked with youth in need. He was an exceptionally generous man – from a modest income, he provided financial assistance to many. In his final years, he found peace with his caring wife of twenty-two years, Shweta Purushotam Wright. Warren was a scholar. He collected and read uncountable books related to religion, philosophy, politics, and history. He was an intellectual explorer in search of life and its meaning. He had a particular interest in America, politics, and statesmanship. He had concerns about political trends and wrote a small

book, *Cry Our Beloved Country*, available as an e-book on Amazon.

Decades ago, Warren wrote four sentences he titled his “Eulogy,” describing the intentions of his life. He so lived that he was prepared at any time to stand before his maker without shame. His integrity was without blemish. To do good was his religion, the world was his country, and all men his brothers. He was a man. This became an accurate description of Warren’s life.
